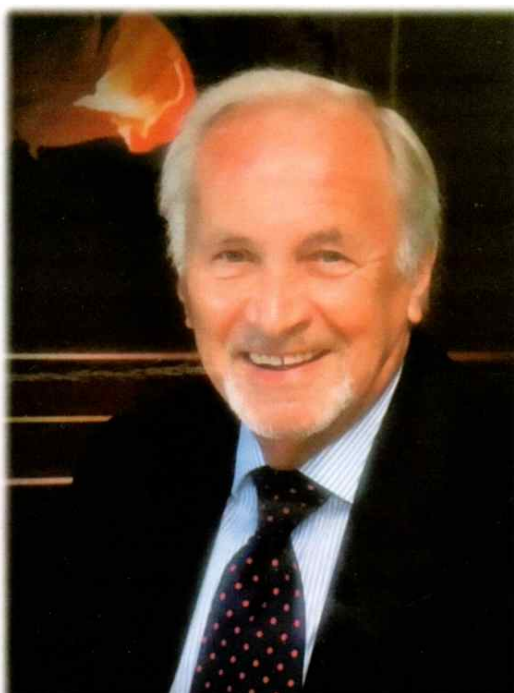

John Bird

1939 - 2019



John was born on the 3 June 1936, the son of a well-known Barnsley family, and spent all his school days in Barnsley until he joined the Army at 18 to fulfil his National Service. On returning to Civvy Street he went to St Lukes Teacher Training College in Exeter, followed by a year at the 'Rose Bruford Drama School' in Kent, returning to Barnsley to start his teaching career in 1959. He spent the next 29 years in the areas around Barnsley, Huddersfield and Hull. His first Headship appointment was in 1969 before moving to Colford Middle School and later Eastfield school, both in Hull. On his move to this area in 1976 his family took up residence in Little Weighton.

It was about this time when he had the urge to have a stall on Beverley Market. This might have been encouraged by a bet with a friend but also the fact that his Grandfather had been a Fishmonger on Barnsley Market. Carol, John's wife, relates his first day's profit of £17.00, encouragement enough to progress jointly to opening a shop in Newland Avenue before moving into North Bar Within in Beverley in 1983.

His role as schoolteacher/shopkeeper lasted until 1988 when he accepted early retirement and simultaneously the family moved into Beverley. He quickly became involved in local affairs, particularly with the Chamber of Trade. This was followed by election to the Town Council in 1999 until 2007 and appointment as Mayor in 2001, and he served on the ERYC from 2003-2011. He was appointed Chairman of 'Beverley Renaissance', a government initiative to encourage local groups to promote ideas to improve community involvement. This was music to John's ears having initiated the Festival of Christmas from the humble start of a few stalls in 1995 to attracting several thousands of visitors in 2018. The event became too large and successful and the responsibility was passed to the Town Council, who subsequently handed it over to the ERYC.

The Festival of Christmas encouraged other ideas, eg. (i) the North Bar Celebration commemorating the survival of the North Bar for 600 years (ii) the 'Battle of Beverley' held at Leconfield with the involvement of the 'Sealed Knot' with over 5,000 individuals taking part in mock battles over a period of two days and (iii) The Georgian Week Celebrations culminating in a Costumed Banquet held in the Beverley Minster. John loved such occasions, enabling him to dress and enjoy his Thespian aspirations.

Having joined the Civic Society he was quickly recruited onto the Executive Committee and his experience and enthusiasm was invaluable. The History Boards featured around the town were of particular interest to him, and he spent countless hours seeking suitable locations to meet with the approval of owners and the local Conservation Officer. The provision of these Boards, and the floodlighting of the North Bar, were funded from monies raised by the Festival of Christmas. The Civic Society are now the beneficiaries of a small balance of these funds, to be used to finance further projects beneficial to the town.

John was a dedicated family man married to Carol and had two sons, Jonathan and David, and four grandchildren. His second love was golf which he was playing at the time of his heart attack. Had he lived for just a few more days he would have celebrated his 57th Wedding Anniversary and witnessed the Promotion of his beloved Barnsley Football Club.

He was a man who preferred consultation rather than confrontation and was respected by all with whom he came into contact. He will be missed, not only by his family and friends, but also for his considerable contribution to the Town he so loved.

An all day outing into North Yorkshire, to visit **Kiplin Hall, a Grade 1 listed Jacobean house by the River Swale, near Richmond.**

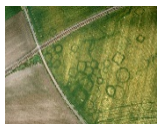

TOWN CENTRES DECLINE OR OPPORTUNITIES

Decades ago commentators were making the point that rigid zoning of land uses was acting against natural organic growth, contrary to the way Towns have evolved.

This cautionary warning was never heeded and now the change in the retail sector policies created by the Land Use Classes Order which prescribes acceptable uses needs to be more adaptable.

Town centres are under threat from online shopping, out of town retail and permitted development. Coupled with burgeoning rents and leasehold constraints the prospects look bleak. Planning policies need to be more flexible allowing market halls, pop-up shops, internet cafes, galleries, museums, craft workshops, gyms and surgeries. Town centres need to become exciting, smart and a centre for the community and much more pedestrian friendly.

Beverley is in a unique position because it is already named as one of the best places to live, but it can not rest on its laurels. It will need to be much more flexible in its retail planning policies in future. The Civic Society has campaigned for years for better design, less clutter of the street scene and has opposed any proposals which would be likely to detract from the Conservation Area. Restriction of car numbers and movement in the centre is becoming more necessary to reduce pollution and give greater priority to pedestrians.

It is the role of the Local Authority to coordinate its departments to implement a comprehensive policy for the town centre. This most sensibly would include an overall coordinator or town centre manager who would ensure linked decision making and protocols, in turn ensuring that staff changes did not affect the implementation of established policies.

Looking at the future, change is inevitable. If centres are to remain as the community hub there needs to be more people living there. Accommodation in empty spaces above shops can not only house people but cross-subsidise the retail activities allowing a lowering of rents for retailers. There are problems with access to upper floors, especially where listed buildings are concerned, but the present waste of useful space has to be addressed.

Beverley has to be active and aware of the need to consider different but compatible uses in the centre. This is a particularly opportune time because the Local Plan is being reviewed. It is difficult to wade through the masses of consultation documents which are published. The Civic Society Executive is keeping an eye on progress but the onus is on everyone to be aware of the changes ahead.

The 'FREEDOM' of BEVERLEY WESTWOOD by Norman & Susan Walker

Susan Walker was for many years the Pasture Masters' Clerk and walks every day on Westwood with her husband Norman. Their knowledge of all aspects of the Pastures is formidable. Now they have produced this splendid book for friends and family. It ends with Susan's account of Westwood during different seasons, and she has kindly given us permission to reprint this. Here is 'Summer' for our Summer Newsletter. Other seasons will follow.

"Summer - Wild pink and white roses ramble over hawthorn trees, the elder trees dangle heavy clusters of green elderberries. Sycamore trees line the roadsides their keys turning pinkish brown and all the different trees present their summer dress in so many shades of green. The grass grows longer and is topped by the neatherd. The horse racing season is in full swing and Westwood is invaded by coaches and cars but it is good to see so many people enjoying the beauty and fresh air, walking, riding, playing games, picnicking and, of course, the horse racing with the horses thundering round the track and the cries of the crowd filling the air with excitement.

As summer days begin to shorten, small yellow flowers known as Ladies Fingers appear and 'trembling grass' has tiny balls which bob about in the wind. Delicate pale blue Harebells are scattered about and the Bramble is covered in flowers followed by the green fruit forming. Into late August and yellow Coltsfoot cover parts of the pasture like bright stars and it is also sprinkled with white and pink clover. Early September, elderberries hang like bunches of little black grapes, brambles are plentiful, black and shiny - hawthorn trees have a red haze of scarlet haws."

FORESTS, WOODS AND TREES

The East Riding of Yorkshire has fewer trees than any other English county, which always seems surprising and also worrying. Suddenly there seems to be a national will to increase trees in the UK, driven by worries about climate change, species extinction and deteriorating air quality. The government this May offered millions of pounds for tree planting; we are inside the projected Northern Forest; the Woodland Trust works to increase trees in our area; and ERYC is part of HEYwoods, an organisation that has recently planted 100,000 trees in Hull. Parish councils are interested in tree planting to offset the effects of the much needed house-building.
